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Keyword vs. Subject searches

- Keyword search** returns results that include some or all of your search term anywhere in the document. Also the person may not be the historical figure you are looking for, i.e., Billy Mitchell (military figure) vs. Billy Mitchell (computer programmer)
- Subject search** returns results that have been indexed for the specific person you are looking for. May not return as many results as keyword search. Not all words have a subject index created for them; in that case many databases will switch to a keyword search automatically.

Research Tips

1. Go to grandledge.lib.mi.us/schooltools
2. **Britannica School** is a great resource. It's set up like a regular encyclopedia, but with even more content – videos, magazines, links to great websites, and an easy to use table of contents.
3. **Research in Context** has lots of magazine and newspaper articles that will help you find information on specific topics and you can take notes, save them, and download the entire article with your notes to your google drive account or print for easy use later.
4. **Kids InfoBits** has a friendly subject structure that will give you links to books, magazine, and newspaper articles. Has the same great note features as Research in Context.
5. You can use a keyword search – Enter your search term – Start with one or two words
 - a. For example, Siberian tiger or cars or skyscrapers
6. You can browse the subject guides – this is great to see results that have already been narrowed down for a specific topic
7. Look at the results you get – these are some of the ways you can refine your search to get just the information you are looking for
 - a. You will see a variety of sources – magazines, newspapers, graphics
 - b. You will see a place where you can limit your search
 - c. You will see a listing of Subjects
 - d. Pick one of the entries – look for related subjects
